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Gender in Disney Movies

Gender roles are defined as behaviors, values, and beliefs that society sees fit for males and females based on one's biological sex. In the Disney movies it is also common for the women to go from their fathers to their husbands. They do not have independent lives of their own. In the Little Mermaid, Ariel goes from her father (King Triton) to Erik her husband. In Aladdin, Jasmine goes from her father (the Saltan) to Aladdin her husband. Jasmine is forced to marry because her father knows he will not be around forever, and even though he does not say it, thinks that Jasmine will be unable to take care of herself without a man around to protect her.

The way characters are dressed is also an issue some people have with the Disney movies. The female characters are always seen in dresses that show their feminine figures, while the male characters are seen in clothing that brings out their stronger side. It also seems to be the case that women's attire is attributed with the light pastel colors while the men and the villains in the movies wear darker, bolder colors. For example, in Aladdin, Jasmine is seen wearing something along the lines of a tube top, and low cut pants that shows off her belly button. Her clothes are also a pastel blue.
