Students will locate resources to be successful in college and specifically at Manchester University. Students will also increase financial awareness, increase civic engagement, learn what makes Manchester University unique, and increase cultural awareness and critical engagement through the *Values, Ideas* and the Arts (VIA) series.

Course Objectives/Outcomes

By the end of this course, students will:

- 1. Locate resources to be successful including:
 - a. Identify on-campus academic resources pertinent to college success.
 - b. Identify community resources, both on- and off-campus, pertinent to a well-rounded life.
 - c. Demonstrate the ability to create an academic plan and follow through to achieve a goal.
- 2. Increase financial awareness including:
 - a. Calculate how financial aid affects the price of college.
 - b. Demonstrate an understanding of budgets.
- 3. Increase civic engagement including:
 - a. Define what it means to be engaged citizens.
 - b. Illustrate the impact of students in local, state, and national communities.
- 4. Learn what makes Manchester unique including:
 - a. Summarize the Manchester Mission and Values statements.
 - b. Explain how liberal arts skills translate into career skills.
 - c. Describe unique academic experiences available at Manchester.
 - d. Identify key aspects of the Manchester culture that relate to the historic ties to the Church of the Brethren.
- 5. Increase cultural awareness and critical engagement with issues, ideas, artifacts, and events through participation in the Values, Ideas and the Arts (VIA) series including:
 - a. Practice participating in civil discourse on complex, often controversial issues by acknowledging one's own assumptions, beliefs, and contexts, recognizing alternative perspectives and thoroughly considering a range of viewpoints.
 - b. Evaluate the relationship of VIA events to different dimensions of Manchester's Mission and Values statement.

Each student is expected to attend the three assigned VIAs for this class. If you do not attend the required VIAs, you will need attend a replacement VIA, that we have mutually agreed upon, and complete a replacement assignment decided by the instructor. If you do not attend one or two required VIAs (or the make-up VIAs and submit the assignments), your overall grade will be lowered one letter grade. If you do not attend/replace any VIAs, two letter grades will be deducted from your overall grade.

Students who do not complete the class service project will also have their final grade lowered by one letter grade.
