At this point I'm not sure they think I am serious but they will get a nice surprise. Also, I have had so much arguing both in and outside the classroom. I am not sure why they find the littlest things to bicker about but they manage just fine. In the hallway, on the way to the bus, evidently one of my boys fake punched a fourth grader waiting in the doorway of a classroom. Finally, I had a boy threaten another student by saying he was going to stab her with his Army knife. He was on the bus before I could speak with him, and since I didn't know what bus he rode it will have to wait until tomorrow morning. All of this happened after lunch. They didn't even have an R for recess before lunch. They are testing the waters and I hope they don't expect me to give up easily or at all.
